



For over the last two years, Brock Bayless has been a staple at StoneBridge Trucking.

He has been consistent, dependable, honest, kind, and humble. When you get to know Brock, you cannot help to like and respect him. When he grabs a truck and assures you he will get the job done, you know it will happen. As truck driver, he is a ringer. Ironically he is a ringer in the alley, which we will get to later.

Brock Bayless was raised in the metropolis of Westport Indiana. Born in 1979, he was raised by his mother Brenda and father Duane. He grew up as a big guy that everyone always liked. His laid back personality and his loyalty to those around him has always been a strong pillar within his character. In June of 1998, he started at Printpack in Greensburg Indiana and remained there for 13 years. While there, he spent a lot of time with former StoneBridge Operator Dave Brown; also employed by Printpack at the time. In 2010, he moved to B&J Express in North Vernon and operated their cargo vans and box trucks. He remained there until 2018 when B&J decided to shut down their box truck operations.

But Brock is not just an avid sports spectator, he is a "Ringer" in the bowling alley. In his life, he has bowled 10 perfect games. Yes, TEN!!!!!!!! Importantly, in the Fall of 2003, Brock's bowling skills were responsible for something that caught the attention of the Indianapolis Star. During league play, he had 4 (four) 800 series sets. What is an 800 series? To achieve an 800 series, you must average 266 per game for 3 straight games. During Brocks run garnishing him state level attention, his highest series was 822 in which recorded a score of 299 two of the three games. At this time, he held a record and the Indianapolis Star interviewed as seen in this article.

Brock is enjoying his time with StoneBridge Trucking.

### Switching balls earns a place in history

Brock Bayless still can't believe what happened to him on Sept. 29 in the Monday Classic League at Rushville Bowl in

Rushville, Ind.

After beginning with a 224 game, the 24-year-old right-hander from Westport, Ind., changed bowling balls to get a better feel in his release. He then flirted with perfect 300 scores in his final two games, winding up with successive 299s for an 822 series.

The two 299 games in one series ties a national record shared

by many bowlers.

"I keep asking myself how come I didn't start out with that new ball," Bayless said. "Both of my final shots in the 299 games were in the pocket. I left a solid 10 pin in the first one and a solid seven pin in the second one. I couldn't believe I had back-to-back 299s."

The 822 was his highest of three 800 series and third 800 in the history of the Rushville Bowling Association. He had 801 and 802 series in Columbus, Ind. Bayless, who also bowls once a week in Greensburg, Ind., has three sanctioned 300 games.

Eight-hundred honor scores were a family affair at Rushville Bowl until Bayless joined the exclusive company. Cousins **Ken Howard Jr.**, manager of Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis, and **Jim Ephlin Jr.**, Rushville Bowl owner, hold the other 800 series.

Howard, who has competed in the Monday Classic at Rushville Bowl the past several seasons, holds the record series of 842 at the 12-lane center. He shot it in February 1990. Ephlin had the second honor series, 802, on Feb. 2, 2002. Ephlin's and Howard's fathers, along with the late Jack Russell, purchased Rushville Bowl one year after it opened in 1960. Four years later Ephlin and Howard bought out Russell. In 1980, Ephlin Sr. assumed sole ownership of the center. He ran it with Jim Jr. until his death in 1984. Jim Jr. has been the proprietor ever since.

"Our bowlers are very supportive of tournaments and leagues," Ephlin said. "We have 13 leagues, three on Monday evening. Ken Howard Jr. holds the second-highest average — 216.24 — among the 60 bowlers in the Monday Classic. Bayless has the fourth-highest average of 212.67."

Ephlin Jr. and Tom Howard, Ken Jr.'s brother, have been active in the Indiana High School Bowling Program. Ephlin has been commissioner of the Mid-Indiana Conference the past two years. Howard has been the Rushville High School boys coach. They'll reverse positions this season, which begins Dec. 1.

Ephlin also has become friends with Indianapolis' Mike Aulby, who last weekend announced this would be his final full-time season on the PBA tour.

"In 1985, an Indianapolis radio station (WFBQ) had a celebrity charity auction," Ephlin said. "One of the things to bid on was a day with Mike Aulby. I didn't know what it would cost, so I bid \$275. A girl also bid \$275, so the station had the two of us finish the bidding live on radio.

"The girl said \$300. I said \$310. She said \$325. In my toughest voice, I said \$350 and told the girl, 'You're gonna lose.' She quit bidding and I got to spend a day with Aulby. It was great. We bowled together at Expo Bowl (in Indianapolis) and he gave me a lesson, a shirt, an autographed ball, a bowling towel and a signed picture."

Service comes in many different shapes and forms. As much as we enjoy telling a Story of Service for one of our US Military Veterans working at StoneBridge Trucking, today we are going to tell a Story of Community Service



This all started when a phone call from Bryan Robbins, Executive Director from Greensburg City Hall, reached out to StoneBridge getting our company information and point of contact for the emergency email chain and updates. StoneBridge Operations Manager and US Army Veteran Brad Stephens told Bryan at the end of our conversation StoneBridge would have trucks and vans available with drivers to donate and help in Greensburg and Decatur County. Bryan said he would pass it along to the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of Decatur County. StoneBridge received a phone call from Doug Smith with Decatur County Memorial Hospital asking if we could pick up nine beds from South Decatur High School on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of April and deliver them to Decatur County Memorial Hospital.



With masks and sanitizer in hand, Brad Stephens and his fiancé, StoneBridge Operator Angie May, worked directly with Doug Smith and the maintenance team of Decatur County Memorial along with Principal Jim Jameson of South Decatur JR/SR High School. Brad and Angie would make two separate runs to pick up the beds. Operators Ken Inscho and JD McClintic and would work to return the beds back to South Decatur a month later.

Brad, Angie, and the StoneBridge team appreciated the opportunity. Brad expressed his appreciation of the opportunity.

"It was great to be able to help out the community where I grew up in, seeing people come together helping one another is awesome to see. 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

Behind the company are people. Know the people - Know the person -Know the company.

Monty Shields was born on May 28, 1955, in Seymour, Indiana. He is the proud son of father Oscar Hilton Montgomery "Big Monty" Shields and mother, Marianne Chandler Shields. He proudly tells his story of how his mother left Jeffersonville to move to Seymour.

When a person walks through the door at StoneBridge Trucking, there are many reasons they have visited. Most of the time, it is a StoneBridge Operator either returning from or about to embark on an expediting or dedicated journey for one of our valued customers. Other times a member of the community is visiting to inquire about our interest in participating in or sponsoring a local activity. Sales representatives are looking to help us advance our operation; at a "small cost," of course. But we often also receive visitors who are interested in applying to join our team. Some end up being a good fit for the StoneBridge Mission and Culture, others . . . . not so much.

In May of 2018, StoneBridge CEO Shane Kennedy received a phone call from Justin McReynolds. "Shane, I know a great guy looking for something that may work with his schedule. He is honest, dependable, trustworthy, and professional. He is also at a point in his life where he is committed to his family and wants to spend time with them and still wants to work. I told him about StoneBridge and to come to talk to you." When Montgomery "Monty" Shields walked through the door on a warm day in May, an experienced professional was about to bring something extra to the StoneBridge Family.

"My Grandpa worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad in Jeffersonville. During the flood of 1937, water was up to the 2nd story of their house. Grandpa got a boat and rowed directly to the second floor of his house. Upon arrival, he loaded his wife (Grandma), his daughter (my mother), and his son in a rowboat. He rowed them to the elevated tracks, boarded a northbound train, and they departed for Seymour, Indiana."

His mother would eventually marry Big Monty, and they would proudly raise Little Monty and his two siblings. Graduating from Seymour High School in 1973, he immediately enrolled at Indiana State University to study music and be a band director. He played the Tuba, Baritone, and String Bass, but hasn't touched them for years. He eventually transitioned to a different path and went to work at the Terre Haute International Airport. It was here he joined Britt Airways in 1976. During his time there, their fleet would grow from five planes to 49. While at Britt, Monty was a licensed FAR 121 Aircraft Dispatcher and the Manager of Flight Dispatch. His choice to join Britt would be arguably the best decision of his life because there was someone special within the company.

"I was a product of internet dating before the internet. We had an airline computer system, primitive by today's standards, connecting all of our stations, including the Flight Dispatch and Reservations. I received a message from Reservations asking me to attend the Interline Club Halloween Party in Indianapolis."

A young lady named Kathy was trying to grow the group and invited Monty. He attended, and the rest is history.

"I came as a redneck. That night we danced to the Monster Mash and fell for her. The very next evening, I took her out to a friend's "wine and cheese" party.

In 1983 Monty proposed, and they were happily married on

April 28, 1984. They would eventually become parents to three boys, Joey, Joshua, and Jacob. Britt Airways would experience some growing pains and sell out to People's Express. Monty saw the writing on the airport wall. Monty moved on to become manager of International Tours of Terre Haute in 1985. During his tenure he managed both offices, leisure, corporate and group travel. January of 1996 brought a new opportunity as Kathy moved to Batesville, Indiana, to work with Hillenbrand as a meeting coordinator. Monty remained behind with the boys to finish the school year. In June of 96', Monty left the agency and joined them.

"When we first moved to the area, we lived in a pop-up camper at Indian Lakes for 3 weeks. It was great until the bugs invaded. Monty laughed when saying, "Kathy was having nothing to do with bugs, and that was that. We found a home and set our roots in Greensburg, Kathy's hometown." With a young family and searching for a career, Monty worked part-time at Pizza King until he found an opportunity at Hillenbrand in the Travel Department. His experience in Flight Dispatch would not be lost for long. The Hillenbrand Corporate Airport hired him in January of 1997 as their Flight Dispatch manager. He would remain there until 2012 when Hillenbrand had to scale back its fleet. and the flight line was no longer a priority. Monty would spend time at the Batesville Casket company for a bit until he returned to the flight line in 2013 after it was purchased by a private entity. In 2015 he left and would spend time in sales at Defender Direct as and later become the manager of the Knights of Columbus in Batesville, leaving there and entering into semi-retirement to focus on family in 2018.

In May of 2018, Monty joined the Stone-Bridge team and has been a crucial part of its local operations team ever since. During the times when StoneBridge customers have a high demand for regional dedicated and expedited deliveries, the team and its fleet can be quickly depleted. But the need for local service remains. Monty has filled this void from day one and has proven to be an extremely dependable operator and professional. He enjoys the job and the flexibility it provides at this point in his life. "I appreciate the people at StoneBridge. They are real human beings. I also enjoy the job and getting to see different places.

Monty's main focus in life is family. He is a proud husband to his wife, Kathy. Her career at the Batesville Casket Company is currently in full stride. 

"It was Good Friday. They were traveling north of North Decatur High School when the accident occurred, and Joey was thrown from the car. My son taught me, his father, many life lessons. Importantly, he was very accepting of everyone. This was an important lesson he taught me. Many loved him due to the person he was and his character.

We all miss him very much."

Former StoneBridge Operator Justin McReynolds had a close relationship with Joey and still has a relationship with Monty and the family. When asked to provide a quote for this article, he did so in the most genuine and loving way possible. There was no other way to summarize and end this *Driver in the Spotlight*.

"I have known Monty since my childhood days when his family lived down the street from me. Great human! When I was entering high school, I became really good friends with his son Joey, so I often ran into him. During my senior year, 2005, I was in a car accident in Batesville. I come to find out he (Monty) was responsible for directing the lifeline to rescue me. Although he did not know it was me at the time, and he was just doing his job as an air traffic controller, what he did just represents the type of man he is. Always willing to give a helping hand. Incredible guy. A couple years later, his son died in a car accident. His son and I were pretty good friends. I remember it to this day. I was in Terre Haute early in the morning with some friends. A call from "Shields Dad" came in. I was confused, so I answered and the words "Joey is no longer with us" came from his mouth. I was devastated. From that exact moment, Monty, Kathy, their other two sons Josh and Jake have become family to me. Over the next 13 or so years, we kept that bond intact and often get together. One day, Monty said he was looking for a post-retirement part-time gig. I was a driver for StoneBridge and thought he would be a perfect fit, so I referred him. A couple years later and he still enjoys driving. Words cannot describe the man Monty is and what his strength means to me."

Carroll Henneke grew up a farm boy in southern Indiana. After graduating from Jac-Cen-Del High School in 1962, he enrolled at Indiana University in 1963. Having enjoyed his time in Bloomington perhaps too much, he took a Cummins Engine job in 1964. Looking for a change, and being self-aware enough to understand that he needed structure and discipline in his young life, he took an oath and left for the US Navy in 1965.

"This was at the height of the cold war I knew I was going to be drafted. In my opinion, the Navy had the best schools. My uncle was a Navy Chief. Everything was leading me to join the Navy."



Carroll was home on leave in 1968.

Like all enlistees who swear an oath to God, Country, and the US Navy, Carroll would attend boot camp at Naval Station Great Lakes in Illinois. "It was cold. frigid. Not sure I left during the best time to go to boot camp". He graduated in November of 1965 and reported to Quonset Point, Rhode Island, in December. It was here that he would wait to study to be an Aerographers Mate, otherwise known as a weatherman. While in waiting, he worked in the galley and as a lifeguard in special services. In 67', he finally got orders to Lakehurst, NJ, to attend Aerographer School (ANC). While calling Lakehurst home, he had some exciting experiences. It was here the Hindenburg was stored before it would eventually become part of history and crash. Carroll vividly remembers the hangars in which the Hindenburg was stored.

Carroll is one of the most Selfless, Dedicated and Outstanding men I have ever had the pleasure to work with. Carroll is one of those that if you give him a job to do you know it will get done and done right. As a Veteran myself, I can attribute some of this to Carroll's service in the Navy.

Not only have I had the pleasure of working with Carroll, but I also have the honor to call him a Great Friend!



"They (the hangars) were so large, they had their own weather within them. It actually rained inside the hangars due to the clouds that formed in them. I was amazed and enjoyed studying the weather ironically at times within a hangar."

While in Lakehurst, he also explored another option,
BEING A NAVY SEAL. At the time, the SEALS were
referred to as the Underwater Demolition Team or "Frog
Men." He passed all the physical qualifications due to the
shape he was in but failed the medical portion. "Even
at a young age, my hand shook, and it disqualified me. The doctor would not overlook it."

Upon graduating from ANC school, Carroll had a choice to make on where he would like to go. He listed two polar opposite locations of preference: NAS Key West and NAS Kodiak. "I liked the beach, but I also grew up a farm boy and was consistently fishing and hunting. Alaska sounded like a place that I could enjoy myself."

In April of 1967, Seaman Henneke received orders. He was shipped to NAS Kodiak, Alaska, where he would eventually put on the rank of Petty Officer Second Class. During this time, the Cold War tensions were high. Unless you failed elementary geography, you know that Alaska is very close to Russia, separated by nothing more than the Bering Strait. It was here he would serve as a Nightime Supervisor with daily 12 hour shifts. His unit was responsible for the forecasts for the Pacific Fleet and Aircraft. Every 12 hours, they had to plan for the worst. Given Alaska's proximity to Russia, his unit conducted Air & Surface Sounding by plotting and disseminating nuclear radiation fallout maps every 12 hours in the event an atomic strike took place.

In September of 1969, Carroll
Henneke received an Honorable
Discharge from the US Navy as a
2<sup>nd</sup> Class Petty Officer. To this day,
he is honored to have served his
country in the United States Navy
and appreciates what the Navy did
for him.



This picture was taken at NAS Lakehurst, New Jersey. It was here that Seaman Henneke studied to be a Aerographers Mate.

"The Navy matured me. I was a young kid on a bad path and desperately needed regimentation. Growing up in southeastern Indiana, my parents worked hard, and I pretty much did my own thing. When I joined the Navy, I was a "wild child," and I needed what the Navy had to offer. I would not trade my experience for anything."

As a retired Department of Natural Resources Officer, Carroll enjoys working with the StoneBridge Operations team. He enjoys the comradery in which he shares with other veterans at StoneBridge.



# Moonlighting at StoneBridge



The job of a Logistics Dispatcher can be challenging and stressful. When a customer needs to ensure their customers are taken care of, StoneBridge Dispatch is the first person to be called when a problem has occurred in the "process". When this happens, the dispatcher becomes the bridge between a StoneBridge Operator, our customer, and theirs. It is essential to be calm under pressure and ready to deal with all the curveballs that are thrown during an expedite.

For the last year and a half, StoneBridge Operations Manager Brad Stephens has been wearing many hats. While overseeing the entire operation, he has been working diligently to uphold a high level of dispatch service to our team, along with our customers and theirs. With this, much growth has occurred, and evening relief was much needed. StoneBridge CEO Shane Kennedy saw this coming:

"It got to the point that it was unreasonable to expect Brad to have the phone 24/7. It would eventually make him ineffective in his role if he didn't have someone who could consistently provide weekend and evening relief. I knew it was time to find someone for this important role. Justin was always our first choice based on everything he has given and has to offer." Behind the company are people. Know the people - Know the person -Know the company.

Justin McReynolds was born on September 16<sup>th</sup>, 1986. One of three children, he is the son of Karen and Jim McReynolds. Born and raised in Greensburg, IN, Justin had a normal childhood growing up. That is until tragedy struck his Senior year of high school. 2005 was a new year, and Spring was getting closer. The finish line of high school graduation was on Justin's calendar. But as the month of January was drawing to a close, tragedy was about to strike.

On a cold winter afternoon, Justin was a passenger in a car that was traveling outside of Batesville, IN close to Jawacdah Farms. The road was covered in snow when the two approached a 90-degree corner covered in snow. Justin doesn't remember anything after that. The car had gone down a 20ft embankment requiring Justin to be lifted out on a stretcher and life lined. After being stabilized at the hospital, Justin spent six weeks in a coma. The Glasgow coma scale provides a score in the range of 3-15; patients with scores of 3-8 are considered to be in a coma. Justin was at a 5.

Ironically, StoneBridge Operator Monty Shields was directly involved in the facilitation of the airlift and vividly recounted the entire incident along with his personal connection to Justin:

"I want to say it was in the winter of 2005, and I was working for Hillenbrand Industries as their Manager of Flight Dispatch at the Hillenbrand Airport. One of the managers at Jawacdah Farm, the Hillenbrand family, and the customer lodge called. There had been a serious wreck just south of them. A car had slid off the road and down a steep embankment.

She said there was a young man trapped, that EMS was working on extracting him and had already called in a Lifeline chopper. "It doesn't look good."

She was notifying us so I could help provide separation with any of our jets that might be in the area as the chopper would be passing through our normal flight path and almost over the airport to get to the scene. She said the victim was from Greensburg, likely in high school, and wondered if I knew him. When she said his name was Justin McReynolds my heart stopped. "J" had been to our house several times and was a close friend of my oldest son Joey. In fact, Joey spent almost every day visiting Justin in Cincinnati while he was in a coma - I think this lasted two months or so. We were so happy (and relieved) when Joey came home to tell us "J" was awake. Since Joey died (2007), we have remained very close with Justin, Lindsey, and their family. In fact, it was "J" that referred me to StoneBridge Trucking. He's grown up and become guite the good man and father (don't tell him I told you so)." ~Monty Shields

Justin would work through recovery and eventually regain a healthy life. With this, he still experienced his struggles as a result of the life-changing accident. He was not proud of his path, but somebody extremely important came into his life in 2014 that would reset his path.

"I met my wife Lindsey in 2014. She is one of the strongest women I have ever met. I met her at the right time. I have no idea where I would be without her".

The two eventually married in 2016 and are raising a family of three together. Their children Karigan (15), Kaden (13), and Alana (5), share a strong bond. Given their ages, life is always busy, and Justin and Lindsey make an excellent team.

Professionally, Justin spent time with Adessa and Honda before joining AVI nearly ten years ago. Having flexibility in the evening, Justin joined StoneBridge part-time in 2017 and worked a couple of years as an evening expeditor. With this, Justin didn't only drive. From day one, he has always shown an additional level of commitment to the StoneBridge Vision and Future:

"It was clear that Justin didn't see us as a part-time job. He has always been committed to the process, the growth, the vision, and our family. He has introduced us to additional customers and referred many additional drivers who have proven themselves as valuable members of our team. Based on this level of commitment, Brad and I found him to be a perfect candidate for the evening dispatch role." ~ Shane Kennedy

In August, Justin assumed this role for two evenings a week and two weekends a month. He has shown a commitment to grow in his position and his bright future, "Moonlighting with Stone-Bridge." StoneBridge is proud of its commitment to the service of those who have served and serving. Our company is owned by veterans and is employed by many who have a history of service to their country.



When Bob King joined StoneBridge Trucking in 2018, he hit the ground running. There wasn't very much grass growing under his feet when he was asked to jump in a cargo van and head to Michigan for a hot-shot load for one of StoneBridge's top customers. Along with this, winter had begun in Indiana, which meant it had established itself in Michigan. Unfortunately, Bob hit the road so fast that a few key details of his past were missed. Bob was a US Navy Veteran and had proudly served in the 1960s. This significant detail went undisclosed for quite some time. Luckily today, his proud story will no longer be private. Thanks to Bob, these interesting years have been divulged for the StoneBridge family and their customers to enjoy and appreciate.

In the Spring of 1964, Bob was about to graduate from high school and was not focused on college. The son of Roy & Dorothy "Dot" King he was born and raised in Oldenburg, IN. Sharing a home with two brothers and a sister, he was ready to move on with his life after high school. While interested in the prospects of getting his education, he fought with the same reservations many face when entering the real world as a teenager.

"I considered college but wasn't interested in it at that point in my life. My older brother was a Navy Veteran, and I felt this was a better option for me."

In June 1964, Seaman Robert King enlisted as a Boatswain Mate. He attended boot camp at Naval Station Great Lakes as a member of Company 252, which would receive recognition as the Color Company. After graduating from boot camp, he was stationed in Norfolk, VA with the Nuclear Weapons Training Center as a communications carrier. In September of 65, after one year on dry land, he boarded the USS Nimble in Charleston. SC. Upon assuming his duties on the ship, he learned the Nimble would have a 6-month deployment to the Mediterranean and eventually take port in Naples and Barcelona.

While in Barcelona, the mission of the USS Nimble would take a turn when a US Air Force refueling mission would go array.

"The Nimble was a minesweeper. Our sole purpose was to protect the fleet. The Air Force had a refueling mission that resulted in a crash in which a nuclear weapon was aboard the plane that crashed".

While this info certainly will cause one to raise a brow in interest, what was disclosed next would allow this particular story to resonate with many around the world.

### Why?

Because they either read the book or watched the movie!

In 2000, the mission that Bob King was a part of was depicted in the Hollywood Blockbuster "Men of Honor" starring Cuba Gooding Jr. and Robert Dinero. In one scene, Cuba Gooding Jr's character was a Navy Diver in search of the lost nuclear warhead.







While Bob was not granted a cameo in the movie, he certainly remembers the mission vividly and is proud of his service during it. Along with his time in the Mediterranean, he also spent time in other global locations, including Naples, Barcelona, and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

After receiving an Honorable Discharge from the Navy in September of 1967, Bob returned to Oldenburg and eventually landed with Stone-Bridge Trucking. He sees a connection between his Naval service and those that work at StoneBridge. "I loved the travel and friendships in the military. Today I get to work with many fellow veterans at StoneBridge and enjoy hearing their stories". "I also appreciate how people treat us when they read the back of our fleet vehicles". The straight trucks and vans in the StoneBridge Fleet read

"American Veteran Owned – American Veteran Driven."

Because of veterans like Bob King, we are

In the Spring of 2008, StoneBridge lost a member of its family when Pete lost his battle with cancer. JD McClintic was just a teenager at the time.




# KENNEDY'S IRISH PUB

# KENNEDY'S IRISH PUB

Now, one question you may be asking is,

"How in the world is President Abraham Lincoln ALLEGED" to be connected to StoneBridge Trucking"?

Well, here it goes . . . . . . .

Located at the back of StoneBridge Trucking is the Kennedy's Irish Pub. While much "history" has been created within the pub (just ask and we have probably forgotten everything), the actual bar itself is an antique

that we believe may have been in the presence of the 16<sup>th</sup> President of the United States. The actual bar located in Kennedy's Pub dates back the mid 1800's when it was located within the Bates House in Indianapolis. During this time, President Lincoln stopped at the Bates House and spoke in route to his inauguration. Later, a reception was held for the President. If you have ever been to a reception, the likelihood that alcohol was served from a bar is high, and we believe this bar could have very likely been a part of that very reception (please see article provided). The Bates House would eventually be made a parking lot and the bar would be purchased and relocated to Greensburg, IN. It moved around for a bit when it finally found itself in the garage of Butch Kennedy's sister, Pat Wic. For years, Pat and her husband would host many people. In the mid 90's, Pat decided to list it for sell at the StoneBridge Antique Mall. Quickly, Butch decided to purchase it from her, and it has remained in the rear of StoneBridge Antiques until Butch had an idea that would change StoneBridge forever.

# 120 years ago today Abe stopped here on way to inauguration

ONE HUNDRED and 20 years ago draped rear platform and deliver a today. Abraham Lincoln spent part of his 2nd birthday in Indianapolis trying to

avoid the Indiana legislature.



Lincoln had just been elected President of the United States and was en route from Springfield, Ill. to Washington D.C. to be inaugurated.

By all accounts at the time, Lincoln's birthday celebration was subdued. The Union was about to divide

and there was much on his mind.

The President-elect left Springfield by train on the 11th and was met at the Indiana state line by a welcoming committee from the Indiana legislature. It was a delegation Lincoln did not expect.

THE TRIP from the state line to Indianapolis turned out to be something of an ordeal. At every stop along the old Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafavette Railroad line, townspeople gathered and bollered for Lincoln to appear on the flagspeech.

At one point, Lincoln was in the midst of telling a story to the crowd at Thorntown when the train suddenly pulled away. When the train stopped next at Lebanon, several persons in the crowd claimed they had ridden horses from Thorntown, so Lincoln finished the story.

When the train arrived in Indianapolis about 5 p.m. to the sounds of a 34-gun salute (one gun for each of the 34 states then in the Union), Lincoln was met by Gov. Oliver P. Morton.

LINCOLN MADE a few remarks and was whisked off at the head of a parade through downtown Indianapolis. The parade ended at the Bates House, a hotel focated on the north side of Washington Street, just west of Illinois Street.

This is where the Claypool Hotel later stood. The site is now a parking lot.

At twilight, Lincoln spoke briefly from a second floor Bates House balcony that faced south. The balcony where he stood was later purchased by Mr and Mrs. Urban Charles Brenner and attached for years to their home at 1306 North Park

That night a reception was held for the next president and his family in the Bates House drawing rooms

THE NEXT morning, the 12th, Lincoln was scheduled to visit the legislature after breakfast with Gov. Morton.

Perhaps because it was his birthday or maybe because he was simply tired of talking. Lincoln ducked out on the meeting while Indiana's lawmakers waited at the Statehouse.

Before leaving Indianapolis, Lincoln was called to the balcony one more time.

While waving to the crowd, some people began hollering for Lincoln's son. Bob, to appear on the balcony and say a few words

According to the Indianapolis Journal of Feb. 13, 1861, Lincoln shook his head and said. "My boy Bob has not yet acquired the habit of making public speeches. You will please excuse him "

The President-elect boarded his train and left for his next stop, Cincinnati,

Indianapolis residents would not see Lincoln alive again. On April 30, 1865, two weeks after he was assassinated, his funeral train stopped in this city on its way to Springfield

Lincoln's body was placed in the Indiana State Capitol Building from 8 a.m. to midnight on a gloomy Sunday while thousands of citizens filed by to pay their last respects

Each time I write a story of service about a member of the StoneBridge team, I am always excited to tell a story that they themselves may not tell. When doing so, I get to learn about a past that I wouldn't ordinarily get a glimpse into. If I do my job right, I will tell the story correctly allowing the veteran to be proud to share it. I am often met with reluctance when asking members of our team to share their military experience, but they are happy to share it once the story is written.

Over the past two years, I have shard many stories of our veterans and each one has been unique. No story is the same. Today I myself have the same feeling of reluctance when writing, but am both proud and humbled of my last 20 years in the US military.

July 26th, 1999 was one of the hardest days of my life. This was the day I officially enlisted in the US Army and would leave the only life I had known for 18 years. I completed my US Army basic training at Ft. Jackson, SC and would go to school Quartermaster School at Ft. Lee Virginia to become an Automated Logistical Specialist. While at Ft. Lee, Virginia, I received orders to go Germany. I was both scared and excited. The Army was really giving me a chance to see the world.

Getting stationed in Europe was one of the best educational experiences of my life. Being from Westport, IN, I was naïve that there was an entire world out there that thought and lived differently than I did. The US Army gave me an education that opened my mind up to the world.

While stationed in Germany, an event happened that forced me to understand why I was wearing the uniform. It wasn't just to see the world. It wasn't just to get money for college. It wasn't simply to have a career and gain a skillset. While I had an agenda when joining, and I had a list of goals I hoped to achieve while serving, I never envisioned spending a career doing so. But, things changed. On September 11th, 2001, I finally realized what serving in the military really meant. Like everyone who experienced that day, I WAS SCARED. I was 20 years old and had no idea what my future would look like, and really didn't understand why 9/11 was happening. What I did know was there was a job to do, and that's why people ultimately join the US military. 9/11 taught me that.

For the next two years, my unit was preparing to be deployed. I had been promoted to Sergeant and my responsibilities were growing. In the Fall of 2002, we learned we would be deployed to Iskenderun, Turkey to support the 4th ID through northern Iraq. While in Turkey, this mission was altered and we spent some time at the Incirlik, AFB. I was set to be honorably discharged in a couple months and was focused on going to Indiana University that summer. But, I saw some off duty military personnel on base wearing Indiana University and Indiana State t-shirts. After striking up a conversation, they let me know about the 181st Fighter Wing. It was a unit in Terre Haute that was part of the Indiana Air National Guard. After learning I could continue serving part-time and go to college, I was committed to continuing my career. I was honorably discharged from the US Army in May 2003 and proudly reenlisted in the Indiana Air National Guard in June 2003.

Joining the Indiana Air National Guard was a great decision. I chose a path in Information Technology to learn a new skill and got to spend 4 months at Keesler AFB in Biloxi, MS. I started at Indiana University in January 2004 and continued my career in Terre Haute for the next 5 years. After graduating from IU in 2007, I had a very specific goal I wanted to achieve. I had always wanted to receive a commission in the US military so I could serve as a Commissioned Officer.

At the time, the opportunities for a commission in the Air National Guard were few and far between. I was frustrated because I had put in the work, put in the time, and the opportunities weren't there. I liked the Air Force, but I chose to once again to look for a branch that would give me the opportunity I had worked hard for.

THAT OPPORTUNITY. On 15 October, 2008, I received one of the biggest honors of my life when I became an
Ensign in the US Navy Reserve. After 3 years of serving in the
Navy Reserves, I had an opportunity to take active duty orders
for recruiting duty. It was a great fit, because I would be able to
simultaneously work through law school at the Indiana University School of Law Indianapolis in the evening.

Recruiting duty exposed me to many opportunities and many wonderful people. A close friend I recruited has since been elected to Congress. Little did I know that Governor Pence would eventually become the Vice President of the United States. I was honored when he awarded me with the Distinguished Hoosier Award while on recruiting duty.



Charlie Mann was born in Louisville, KY in 1954 and his family quickly moved to Lebanon, IN thereafter. The son of John and Nita, his father joined the Navy at the age of 15 years old and later became a truck driver, while his mother Nita stayed at home to raise his 5 brothers and sister. In 1972, he graduated high school and worked at Kroger to pay his was through community college. During the summer of 1975, he continued his education by transferring to the University of Kentucky and would proudly graduate in 1977 with a degree in Agriculture. Not only is he proud of his Wildcat education, he is extremely proud of the process of graduating. "I worked the entire way through and completely paid my own way. I worked hard and am proud of what I accomplished."

With a degree in Agriculture, Charlie would spend many years doing what he was educated to do: Working in the midwestern farm system. Starting in 1980, he managed the Pumphrey's Hog Farm while he and his then wife Joanne started and raised a family. They have two boys together. His son John has 5 children and serves in the Navy specializing in Nuclear Propulsion. His son David is a US Army Captain and has a baby girl.

In 1993, Charlie went to work for Farm Bureau COOP as a Swine Service Specialist. In 1997 he continued his career in Frankfort, until the farm was sold in 2010. At that point he worked in Greenfield until he joined StoneBridge in 2017. When Charlie joined StoneBridge, he was ready for a new path. "I was ready for a change. I wanted a different pace and given my relationship with Butch Kennedy, I felt StoneBridge would be a good fit." In 2010, the Frankfort farm where Charlie worked was shutdown for 6 months and Charlie joined StoneBridge as a driver during that time. "I had a good feel for what StoneBridge was about and felt comfortable from day one given my history with them."

What caught Charlie off guard was the amount of growth StoneBridge was experiencing when he arrived. In 2010, StoneBridge had 4 box trucks with a team of 8 drivers while Butch Kennedy ran the entire operation. In July 2017, Stonebridge had 10 trucks with a team of 15 drivers. "It has a become an energy driven company. Parts are always moving. When the phone rings, I never know what to expect. You must be flexible and be prepared to learn something new. One second things will be quiet and then all chaos will break



out as the customers start calling for expedites."

For a small company experiencing growth, the maintenance job can be both frustrating and unforgiving at times and you must have a positive attitude. StoneBridge Operations Manager Brad Stephens quickly noticed why Charlie was fit for the position:

"Charlie always has a wonderful attitude.
Nothing phases him. Regardless of the situation, he always handles everything with poise.
He also elevates the entire mood at Stone-Bridge in a positive way. He is always telling a joke and laughing, regardless of whether we get the joke or not."

When orientation takes place for a new StoneBridge team member, our business is always described as "ORGANIZED CHAOS". Over the last year, Charlie Mann has always been on call. He has been on call to do a last-second fix to a truck. He has been on call to do a last-minute run when there were no other StoneBridge drivers available. He has been on call to take a phone call at 1am in the morning when a StoneBridge operator is experiencing mechanical issues. Simply, Charlie Mann is ALWAYS on call and ALWAYS answers the call.

"Charlie Mann is my friend first and foremost. As a friend, I truly love him dearly. He is a wonderful person. # DOUG SPON IS A VIETNAM VETERAN . . . HE IS ALSO MY GRANDPA!!!

Born in 1950 in Sharon Pennsylvania to Ray and June Spon, Doug Spon grew up in family dedicated to service. Ray Spon served in the Navy, and his brother Rick Spon, retired from the US Navy in 2003 as a Commander. In December 1968, Doug Spon made the decision to also serve his country. Like many during this time he was posed with a very tough question: Enlist or get drafted?

At the time, the Army allowed him to enlist without a high school diploma. "I was ready to go, I liked land, and liked fixing stuff. Being a mechanic in the US Army made sense." Doug would attend Basic Training at Fort Benning, GA and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Jackson, SC. After completion of his training in May 1969, Doug Spon would receive orders to Chu Lai, Vietnam. Upon arrival Doug was stationed at LZ Baldy until he and a friend made a mistake. "There was a base wide urinalysis. A Sergeant gave me a cup and told me to "fill it up". I did so, except I filled it with Vodka. Seemed funny at the time, but they didn't find the humor in it when the results came back." Based on this, Doug was moved to LZ Siberia as punishment. During this time, although trained as a mechanic, he spent the majority of his time running convoys as part of the Quick Reaction Force (QRF).

After a year in Vietnam, Doug would serve 2 years in Ft Bragg, NC where he would reenlist and receive orders to South Korea. On location, he spent his first 4 months as a mechanic until he was summoned to meet with a Sergeant Major. After formation, SGT Spon was told to get in a Jeep and go to Seoul. Following a two-hour drive, the subsequent conversation ensured:

Sergeant Major: "SGT Spon, you need a haircut."

Sergeant Spon: "You had me come all this way to

tell me that?"

Sergeant Major: "No, you are going to be the

General's Driver."

Sergeant Spon: "How?"

Sergeant Major: "You were selected."

Sergeant Spon: "How?"

Sergeant Major: .. (insert speechless pause

here) . . . Get your stuff.



Doug would spend his remaining time in Korea as the General's Driver until he was stationed in Ft. Riley Kansas in April 1972 for 1.5 years as part of the 1<sup>st</sup> Infantry Division. While there he was part of the 701<sup>st</sup> MSB and assigned to Alpha Company. (Ironically, when I (Shane Kennedy) Joined the Army in 1999, I was stationed in Germany in the sister unit. I was assigned to Alpha Company 701<sup>st</sup> MSB in Kitzingen, Germany as part of the 1<sup>st</sup> ID in 2000). After Kansas, Doug received orders to Baumholder Germany where he would finish his career and receive an Honorable Discharge after 7 years, 9 months, and 23 days

"I enjoyed my time in the military. It did a lot for me. I grew up." After Doug completed his initial training, he returned home to visit with family. Growing up, he had a few "encounters" with the local deputy sheriff. When this same deputy saw him in uniform he stated,

"This is the best decision you ever made young man".

In the fall of 2016, StoneBridge Trucking was starting to catch a glimpse into its future. The customer base was growing, processes were being improved, and the fleet was receiving some much needed updates. With all the progress that was being made, one key component to a successful logistics company was proving to be a challenge; as felt throughout the industry: FIND SOLID DEPENDABLE, COMPETENT DRIVERS that will provide the service required by StoneBridge and demanded by its customers.

Later that fall, an ad was ran in all of the local newspapers searching for drivers that would fit the StoneBridge Trucking employment model. A week after the ad was run, Bill Gamble reached out to StoneBridge CEO Shane Kennedy to introduce himself via telephone. Kennedy liked what he heard. "Bill was impressive, he had a successful history of hard work in the logistics and manufacturing industry, and seemed confident to drive a straight truck. With this, he had served his country. I was comfortable giving him a shot, but was uncertain that StoneBridge was a good fit for his needs at that point in his life". A few days later, Kennedy received a call from Bill "My wife and I discussed this opportunity. We really like what you are doing with veterans and I would like to give this a go". Little did Kennedy know at the time, but he had just hired StoneBridge Trucking's first

an honor given to a StoneBridge Operator within their first year accounting for safety, miles driven, and many other numerous factors in which StoneBridge holds paramount. Behind the company are people. Know the people - Know the person - Know the company.

#### Bill Gamble was

born on December 15th, 1959 in Rockford, IL. His father was a musician and his mother was a housewife. Growing up, Bill had always been called to serve his country. In 1977, upon graduating from high school, Bill enlisted in the US Army. His career in the military would take him to Korea, Texas, Kansas, Panama, Alaska, and Germany while serving in Calvary. Bill could have very well spent a career in the US Army, but he and his then wife experienced something no parent would ever want to experience. "I was in the middle of tactical field exercises in Grafenwoehr, Germany, when I was contacted that I had to be home with my family immediately. The Squadron Commander sent me home in a helicopter to my base in Amberg, Germany." When Bill arrived home, he received the news that his 2 month old daughter had passed away from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Recollecting this life changing event, Bill Gamble remembers it vividly .:



"It was quite possibly the worst, if not one of the worst moments of my life. I would never wish that experience on any parent or loved one."



Bill and his wife Debbie have been married since December 5th.

This experience caused an ex-

treme level of stress of pain for Bill, which ulti-

mately took a toll on his marriage and military career. He and his then wife were divorced and after nine years of military service, Bill received an Honorable Discharge from the US Army. He returned to Indiana in which he would eventually marry is wife Debbie on December 5th, 1986. Bill began his career in logistics when he drove a truck for 3 years for Days Express and eventually for Rumpke. Bill finally decided to spend 18 years working for Knauf Insulation which ended due to a knee surgery.

**Bill currently** holds his AS in Visual Communication and is presently 12 credits away from a BS in Graphic Design. He is a proud husband, father of four, and grandfather of eleven. His daughter Lee is a paralegal and happily married with four boys. His daughter Amanda works in management and is a proud mother to a son. His son Chris works as the Sports Director for the Shelbyville Parks Department and is a proud father of 3. His daughter Carrie is the proud mother of 3.

Since October 2016, Bill has literally and figuratively been "rolling" with StoneBridge Trucking. Once he was in a straight truck, he has never looked back. He has quickly climbed the ladder at StoneBridge and worked extremely hard to earn the honor of the Stone-Bridge Trucking "Rookie of the Year". Shane Kennedy is proud of the decision to bring Bill on board.

### Past, Present, & Future of StoneBridge

In June 2016, Shane Kennedy had just come off Active Duty for the Navy and joined the StoneBridge Trucking Family when then Operations Manager Garry Hadler made it very clear in saying "We need more freight, more customers, and need to offer more capacity and services to our current customers". Having experience in sales, he hit the road. "I was confident I could sell StoneBridge and our services. That is by far the most important part of sales, believing in your product or service. My dad started the company, Garry and the team offered a fantastic service, it was up to me to find the people who would find value in what we offer." At that time in 2016, Stone-Bridge had 4 total box trucks and 4 cargo vans with a team of 7 total drivers. Kennedy remembers looking at the company and seeing its potential. "We were small but extremely efficient. We were averaging anywhere from 50-70 loads a month and we kept our business model simple. With this, I knew there was plenty of room for growth because our current customers were telling us."

The consistent feedback he was receiving was as follows:

- More availability = more trucks and drivers
- More capacity = more weight
- More services = lift gates on the trucks

Based on this feedback StoneBridge has grown from 4 box trucks & 4 vans to 10 box trucks and 5 vans. They forecast adding an additional 4 - 5 box trucks for an overall fleet growth of 250%. The StoneBridge Team has grown from 7 employees to 25 for an overall growth of 357%. StoneBridge is now averaging 140-175 loads per month for a growth of 258%. With this, the feedback remains the same . . . MORE AVAILABILITY - MORE CAPACITY - MORE SERVICES. "We are still hiring competent drivers who fit our model and are adding a LARGE TANDEM AXLE BOX TRUCK that can haul up to 20,000LBS. In two - three years, we hope to add full size 53ft trucks because OUR CUSTOMERS ARE ASKING US TO DO SO, both old and new."



This growth requires space. We have now located our fleet and maintenance center to a new location only 1 minute away from the StoneBridge Headquarters and Dispatch Center. Kennedy is thrilled to lease this location. "This location came available at a perfect time and is owned by a good trustworthy friend of StoneBridge and my family. It has everything we need to support our growing operation and business model with 3 maintenance bays, storage area, and a cross loading dock.

With this growth comes a high level of responsibility and an understanding of how the logistics industry works. Upon joining StoneBridge, Kennedy did his homework and found the #1 reason logistics companies fail is because they get too big too fast. "The economy is really good right now and our customers have been great to us. But we have to always be planning for when the economy begins to slow down. Our growth has been responsible and our outlook remains positive. We will strive to continue to support our customers for the long term."

### US Air Force Veteran Terry Hogg

For many men who grew up in the 50's and 60's, they remember it as a great time to be an American. Being a "Baby Boomer" was a great experience for many. A defining element of the 50's was the Cold War, and the 60's proved to be a time of change in America. Growing up during these years would often eventually lead the young men of the United States to make an important decision: Sign up for the US Military or wait to potentially be drafted and sent to Vietnam?

Terry Hogg was born in June of 1953 and grew up in Greensburg, Indiana. In 1971, Terry and his good friend Rob Hood where about to head to Indianapolis to join and saw their friend Jeff Meyer working at a local gas station. Jeff's boss thought he was simply going to lunch, but Jeff was ready to join them. That afternoon, Terry's morn Nelly Hogg took all three boys to Indianapolis to take the military entrance evaluation test.

"Rob and I were supposed to be on the buddy system, it didn't work out that way unfortunately".



In November 1971, Terry Hogg enlisted and took off for the US Air Force to attend Basic Training at Lackland AFB, Texas. Upon graduating basic training, he was sent to Chanute AFB in Rantoul, IL. "It was the coldest weather I had EVER experienced. I hated it. We had to wear leather masks on our face. Definitely lets you know how cold it was and the cold weather technology of the time."

While at Chanute, Terry trained to work on Aerospace Ground Equipment. Upon graduation from tech school, he was shipped to APO San Francisco where he would find his final destination to be his first permanent duty station: Saigon (Ho Chi Minh City), Vietnam.

"I was 18 years old and found myself in Vietnam. When I arrived and walked off the plane, it felt like I was in an oven. It was such a complete shock and contrast to my experience at Chanute AFB. I had transitioned from what I thought was the coldest place in the world to the hottest. After showering, I would immediately be soaking wet from sweat before I could even dry off."

Terry was in Saigon for nine months when President Nixon stated that the Vietnam War was coming to a "conclusion as a result of the plan that we have instituted." At this point, Terry was flown to Tokay, Thailand where was to spend a total of four months and be eventually sent home. "I was told I was going home, but was rather sent to Tacoma, WA for six months." At this point, Terry decided that he would be willing to go back to Thailand if his service was going to be extended. "I had put in my request and made a voluntary statement that I wanted to serve in Thailand. Ironically, I was advised that if I wanted to go back to Thailand, that I needed to withdraw this statement which lacked all possible logic. Going against my logical reasoning, I withdrew my statement requesting to be stationed in Thailand, and was then assigned to Thailand shortly after. I simply cannot make this up. Anyone who ever served in the military can understand." SSgt Hogg would spend 13 additional months in Thailand totaling over 560+ days served in Southeast Asia. At one point, Terry hadn't spoken to his parents for over 3 months. The Red Cross was notified and the communication line between Terry and his parents was open once again.

In 1975, SSgt Hogg was honorably discharged from the US Air Force and was sent home. When he returned home, he saw his morn walk by prompting the following conversation:

Son: Who you looking for lady (in jest)? Mother: I am here to see my son.

Terry was flabbergasted. "She didn't even recognize me. She simply walked right past me. I had grown up. The boy that left her was now a man."

In 1976, Terry was ready for another challenge. He signed a three year enlistment in the Army Reserves as a Sergeant serving as a Field Director Commander (FDC). Terry's time in the Army Reserves was a little bit less eventful. He laughed when sharing the fact that his only deployment in the Army Reserves was to Chicago during the mail strike. Overall, Terry's experience in the military was a positive one that has proven to be something in which would be proud of. "I loved the travel, it made me grow up and mature at a very fast pace." Terry went on to earn a Degree in Architectural Design & Building Construction. After many years raising his family and running the family business, Terry is thrilled to be a part of StoneBridge Trucking which is American Veteran Driven. "I enjoy the work and the people. I really enjoy the customer service aspect of our job, and appreciate the comradery I share with the StoneBridge team and the veterans in its ranks."



In August, Shane finally received a call from Brad.


"Shane, I like what you guys are about, and I would like to work for Stone-Bridge."






Understanding Forrest's success at StoneBridge, and the character he brings to the job, can be partly attributed to his service in the United States Air Force.

In 1958, Forrest graduated high school and enlisted. When considering the military, the choice for Forrest was simple at the time. "The draft was inevitable, and I knew I had to make a choice. I had two brothers, one served in the Army and the other in the Navy. I also had three brothers-in-law who served in the Army, Army Air Corps, and Navy. I had a very good idea of what to expect from each service. I chose the Air Force, they had the best food."

Upon enlisting in the Air Force, Forrest went to Basic Training during a very
unusual time. His basic training only
lasted 3.5 weeks when the average at
the time was 8 weeks. It was during this
time that national temperatures were so
hot, there were Marines who died
marching during training at Paris Island,
SC. Forrest said "Because of this,
there was a law passed for everyone
limiting our outdoor training due to
the temperatures, and my initial training was cut short."





After completing basic training, Forrest became an Airborne Radar Repairman while studying at Keesler AFB, MS. This skillset would eventually land him in the city of Tripoli located in Libya, Africa. The base he served on had a vast history. It began as a Mercedes Benz test site, and eventually housed the German military during World War II. Once the war ended, the United States occupied it, eventually welcoming A3C Forrest Sandefur as a member of the 58th Air Rescue Squadron. During his time in Tripoli, an historic event occurred when a U2 jet was shot down in Russia.

"We spent three days "looking" for that jet. Our government knew where it was, we knew where it was. It was in Russia, but we weren't allowed to cross into their air space. So, in order to give the appearance we were making the effort to find it, we spent three days flying along the border of Turkey and Russia "looking" for it. It was very frustrating for everyone involved".

After leaving Tripoli, Forrest finished his Air Force career in Columbus, OH. It was here that he learned how to get the Air Force to honor his contract and grant him his Honorable Discharge. "I was in a highly critical field, and they were trying to retain all Radar Repairman by alluding that we couldn't get out. It was then that I read a recent Air Force Times article and found the regulation had been updated, officially allowing me to be discharged."

Upon finding this information out, Airman Third Class Sandefur promptly paid a visit to the base retention Officer. The officer made a diligent effort to retain Forrest and the conversation went as such:

A3C Sandefur: I would like to request my Honorable Discharge.

Retention Officer: You read the Air Force times didn't you?

A3C Sandefur: Yes sir I did.

Retention Officer: You realize life outside the military is exactly the same don't you? You will still have someone you have to report to and take orders from?

A3C Sandefur: Well sir, it's not exactly the same. Out there I can tell them to "Go to Hell" and not go to jail for it.



A3C Sandefur was Honorably Discharged for the US Air Force on the 25th of May, 1964. Having married is wife Sharon in 1962, they are proud parents to their daughters Laurie and Marcy. He is proud of his lifetime of hard work, and if you ever have the opportunity to spend 5 minutes with Forrest, you will find him to be an extremely kind gentleman who is proud of his service and enjoys working for StoneBridge Trucking.



# HE FOUGHT, HE'S FIGHTING, HE'S WINNING!

### THIS CHRISTMAS, STONEBRIDGE OPERATOR DAVE BROWN AND HIS FAMILY HAVE SOMETHING TO BE VERY THANKFUL FOR. Dave

Brown has spent the majority of his professional career as one of the most dependable drivers in the industry. Dave has been with StoneBridge Trucking for over 6 years. While with StoneBridge, he has built a reputation of honesty, dependability, and character. When Dave is called to expedite a load, the answer is always "I am on my way".

On a cold winter day in February 2015, something changed. Dave had to prioritize and could no longer carry the dependability torch for StoneBridge. Dave had a history of having a fatty tumor on his left breast, but this time, something was different. "In 3 weeks time, my breast had doubled in size and I was in extreme pain." Dave's fatty tumor was no longer a "tumor". He had developed stage 3 (three) cancer and immediately needed 9 lymph nodes removed, 5 of which were cancerous.


As is the case with most cancer patients, Dave wasn't the only one affected by this life changing event. Norma, his wife and best friend of 12 years and daughter Ashley, were distraught and heartbroken over the news. "They both broke down in tears, and were extremely scared. I told them it would be ok and that we would get through this".

In March 2015, Dave began post-operation treatment for his breast cancer. He underwent 4 months of chemotherapy followed by 2 months of radiation therapy. The US Navy veteran reflects on the experience as one of the most challenging in his life. "It absolutely zaps the energy out of you. I lost all of my hair, and it honestly ages you. 



StoneBridge is proud of its commitment to the service of those who have served and serving. Our company is owned by veterans and is employed by many who have a history of service to their country.



In the Spring of 1964, a Navy Recruiter presented at Arlington HS outside of Rushville, IN. Morris "Butch" Kennedy was listening. Butch grew up on a farm, and was not keen spending the rest of his life working there. His older brother Lloyd Kennedy had served in the Navy, so Butch decided to approach the recruiter and the following conversation occurred:

Butch: "If I join the Navy, is there any way I could ever end up on a farm?"

Recruiter: "You will never be in one place long enough to grow corn."

Butch: "That's all I need to hear, see you in the Fall ."

On September 2nd, 1964, Morris Allen Kennedy enlisted in the United States Navy. He remembers his mother being extremely unhappy when he left to attend Basic Training at Naval Station Great Lakes, IL. "She was scared, she loved me, all moms are scared."

After completing his basic training,
Butch completed Class A Machinist school on
his way to becoming a 3rd Class Petty Officer in
the Navy. It was upon graduation, that Butch
learned he would be assigned to the USS
Kearsarge. Upon arrival, he was both lost and
amazed. "It was the largest ship I had ever
seen. I was lost for my first three days
aboard, then all of the sudden, the ship
was moving." At this point, since the ship
was underway, he figured he would find out
what happened next, "I asked the closest
person I could find what was going on, in
which they responded: Son, we are going
to Vietnam."

Butch would go on to serve in the Navy until he was Honorably Discharged on 30 August, 1968. He is proud of his service and how the experience has positively influenced his life.

While serving, he was able to see the world. He visited Hawaii, Yokuska Japan, The Gulf of Tonkin, Singapore, Sasamo Japan, Hong Kong, and the Phillipines.

Importantly, it opened his mind up to the world while allowing him to appreciate home. At first I was incredibly homesick, but I was so thankful for the opportunity to serve. As I traveled the world, it made me appreciate other cultures, religions, and people, while developing a deep appreciation for the United States. My service in the Navy still directly reflects on who I am as a person, and my company, Stone-Bridge Trucking. It was one of the best decisions I have ever made.



In1972, Donald "Ziggy" Ziegenfus contemplated a decision many were pondering in 1972: *Join the military, or wait to be drafted*? At that time, Ziggy had a brother-in-law in the US Navy, and was not drawn towards the Army. On a Spring afternoon, his mother drove him to a recruiting office and signed the paperwork herself, allowing him to enlist in the US Navy at the young age of 17. "I was ready. On June 6th I graduated high school, and by June 27th, I was at boot camp in Great Lakes, IL."



Early in his career, Ziggy spent time

stateside in Little Creek, VA onboard the USS Atakapa (ATF-149) and at a Naval Sub Base in New London, CT. During his time at New London, he was ready for a career in the Navy. "While in New London, I reenlisted for Navy Yeoman school, and new at that I point I would serve for 20 years." After a short stint at Patuxent River, MD, Ziggy received orders to serve at what would turn out to be his favorite tour of his career: Navy Controller Shipping Office - Bahrain. Bahrain is a small island off the coast of Saudi Arabia, and Ziggy served at this Middle East location from 75' - 79'. Bahrain is very different from many think of the Middle East, it is a very westernized country with no fanatical influence. I lived off base the entire time while stationed there. Ziggy also enjoyed



the fact that there were only approximately 40 personnel serving on his base at the time, and thoroughly enjoyed being part of the Commanding Middle East Force.

As much as Ziggy enjoyed Bahrain, he had many more rewarding tours of service ahead of him. In 1980, he was stationed in London, England at the Fleet Ocean Surveillance Intelligence Center. "It was a different experience, I never wore a uniform. I wore a suit and tie every day." After London, Ziggy would spend 5 years in Washington, DC performing in many different roles. Amongst them was working for the Chief of Naval Operations as an Assistant Flag Writer as well as working for the Defense Intelligence Agency.

In 1988, Ziggy's career was winding down, but one of his most proudest moments was still in front of him. At this point in his career, Ziggy had returned to the Middle East and was serving in Saudi Arabia as part of the US Navy Detachment - US Military Training Mission. It was here that he assisted in training the Saudi Arabian Military on minesweepers and patrol boats. While serving in Saudi Arabia, Ziggy would achieve what many enlisted Sailors spend there careers working towards:

### The promotion to Chief Petty Officer.

US Navy Chief Petty Officers are the absolute backbone of the US Navy. Ask any Junior Officer in the Navy who they depend on the most.

"The most important person that determines the success of the mission and the growth of our Sailors is the Chief Petty Officer". After being promoted to Chief in 1990, Ziggy would eventually retire from the US Navy in 1992. "My 20 years of service went extremely fast. I served during the Cold War, Vietnam, and Gulf War. I learned what it meant to "take responsibility" and "be accountable". Since 14 years old, I have had 5 jobs: Burger Chef,

US Navy, Funeral Director, Hotel Night Audit, and Stonebridge Trucking. Its rare to spend a life working without moving from job-to-job, and I am proud of that."

Given Ziggy's history of Honorable Service, he feels a connection to Stonebridge Trucking and its motto:

American Veteran Owned - American Veteran Driven.

"Part of our job is to be dedicated and responsible to our customers. This was no different than the dedication and responsibility I had to my Sailors and shipmates while serving. I really enjoy working with the other operators at Stonebridge who also served and feeling connection on those who have served can appreciate."



### The Genesis of StoneBridge Trucking

#### Where did the word "Stonebridge" in Stonebridge Trucking come

from? Last December, during the Stonebridge Christmas party, that question was posed to the compa-

ny's founder, Butch Kennedy. During the 80's, Butch lived outside of Greensburg, IN in which there was an old stone bridge he crossed every day to get home. One day, after receiving a lot of rain, the river the bridge crossed flooded and the bridge was highly damaged and half of it collapsed deeming it structurally unsafe to utilize. Butch's father, Paul Kennedy, was well into his 80's when he decided that day, he wanted to see his son. The authorities had yet to blockade the bridge to prevent utilization, when he remembers seeing his father after he had crossed the bridge.

Butch vividly recollects the conversation he had with his elderly father. "I came home, and to my surprise, my father was waiting for me on my porch with his socks and shoes off. He crossed another flooded bridge prior to crossing the old stone bridge in front of my house. I said Dad, why in the world did you cross that bridge, you

could have been killed?" His Dad responded simply "I wanted to see my son". Shortly after this exchange, the county authorities arrived and assessed the damage and shut down the bridge entirely. Butch remembers thinking to himself "My father is the last person to crossed that old stone bridge".

In 1992 Butch Kennedy started Stonebridge Antiques and would later go on to found Stonebridge Trucking in 1999 when his son left for the military. "I no longer needed insurance for Shane once he joined the military, so I took a chance at working for myself, and gave the trucking industry a shot". Butch started the company with 2 trucks, and would only drive on the weekends when he had free time from his original job. "We registered my pickup truck for expedites and had a 1992 Ford F-350 with a 16ft box on the back. I was so extremely appreciative when Batesville Tool and Die gave us our first load".

Butch worked extremely hard to start the company, took a chance, and is proud of the results. "I am

proud that it worked, and am proud of what it stands for. When I see the name StoneBridge, I always think back to my father on that day. He wanted to see his son, and nothing was going to stop him from doing that."

In April 2017, StoneBridge CEO Shane Kennedy, traveled to Bahrain to complete his Annual Training for the US Navy Reserve. Referenced early in the newsletter when outlining StoneBridge Operator Donald Ziegenfus' Navy Career, Bahrain is small island off the coast of Saudi Arabia in the Arabian Sea. Like his family, he was a bit reluctant prior to leaving. "I spent time in Iskenderun, Turkey at the beginning of Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003, but that was the only Middle Eastern country I had experienced to date. Yes, I was a little reluctant to fly 14 hours



across the world for two weeks of training, but glad I did it."

As a Supply Officer, LT Shane Kennedy worked as an Assistant Air Logistics Officer for U.S. Naval Forces Central Command - CTF 53. While supporting the CTF 53 mission, he supported the FIFTH

Fleet AOR, including USS MAKIN ISLAND Expeditionary Strike Group and USS GEORGE W. BUSH Carrier Strike Group.

Along with this, he oversaw a variety of tasks including Cargo and Mail management and worked directly for civilian personnel at the CTF 53 air passenger terminal. During this

period, he received training to oversee the Air Force Air Mobility Command's palletizing procedures, which successfully built cargo pallets for operational units throughout the CENTRAL COMMAND Area of Operations.

"The entire experience was beyond enlightening. At first, when driving from the airport, I was very concerned about my surroundings, but that quickly changed. Regardless of what I see on TV, I now know there are countries in the Middle East who, while sharing a predominately different religion, share the same values we do. They want freedom, peace, and to enjoy life. I was made aware of this while there. I was privileged to have received this experience while serving."

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
